In her book *The Reed of God*, the Catholic writer and artist Caryll Houselander speaks poetically of Mary, the mother of Jesus, as "a reed, / straight and simple / growing by a lake / in Nazareth". Mary, like a reed, is open to the Spirit of the Lord dwelling in her heart and soul, "a reed that is empty / until the breath of God / fills it with infinite music". She is a reed that bends to carry the music of love and the Son of God in her very body: "The word of God / is infinite music / in a little reed". Our readings today are poetic and beyond the everyday language used by most of us.

However, the use of such poetic language can speak to us of a world beyond – beyond our understanding and beyond our dreams. All three readings today offer a vivid picture of a creative and innovative future. This is a future dreamed of, and hoped for, when God's kingdom in all its beauty will be fully revealed. In this new future, good prevails over evil. In this new future, Christ himself, the new Adam, brings the promise of eternal life, and Mary, in openness to bearing Christ, God's Word, enables the Spirit of love to sing a new song for our world.

The word of God to us in all our readings today speaks of new life, of birth and of fruitfulness. In our first reading, the book of Revelation tells us of God's sanctuary in heaven opening and a great sign appearing in the sky. This sign is of a woman giving birth: a sign of new life and of future prosperity. As with every birth, there is an element of risk and we see the evil one (depicted as a dragon in John's vision here) seeking to destroy the child. After a titanic struggle, God and goodness prevail. The woman gives birth to a male child, a sign of God's favour and one who is destined to rule the nations. In today's second reading, Christ, who has been raised from the dead, is seen as the second Adam, anointed of the Father; and the Father offers new life to those who belong to Christ.

In today's Gospel, Mary journeys to visit her cousin Elizabeth. Mary must have wondered, as she carried this new life within her, what the future held for herself and her child. Travelling in haste through the hill country, Mary is anxious to share her news with someone who understands how she feels, someone who is experiencing the same joy and possibly the same uncertainty as she is. Elizabeth's greeting confirms for Mary that she is carrying the Lord, the anointed one – the Messiah for whom the people of Israel have been waiting. Elizabeth is overwhelmed by the coming of the mother of the Lord to visit her, so much so that the child in her womb leaps for joy. Elizabeth goes on to say of Mary, "blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled". In these words, Elizabeth both affirms Mary in her carrying of the anointed one and offers a model of faith and discipleship for all who might desire to bear Christ in their hearts and lives. Mary's response is to proclaim the greatness of God, in the song we know as the Magnificat.

The openness of Mary to God's word allows the immensity of God's love to fill her physically, spiritually and totally. God's fullness and goodness in the lives of Elizabeth and Mary find expression in words of thanksgiving and joy. Openness and hospitality of heart are gifts we can cultivate in our own lives and offer to others.

Mary and Elizabeth reached beyond their own needs and concerns, and thus they provided a safe and comforting environment for one another. Might God be asking us, like Mary and Elizabeth, to reach out beyond our own needs and to encourage and support someone close to us? When we are able to reach out in such a way, we become, in the poetic words of Caryll Houselander, "a cradle for God", a "light in a dark house" and "warmth to the world". Then we will truly be "the breath of the spirit of love" for all whom we encounter.
